Our community does not have a separate Indigenous CAB, however, we do have Indigenous representation on the CAB.

As part of the expansion of the street outreach team, and to better support the Indigenous population that is experiencing homelesseness, an Indigenous Outreach Worker position was created and funded through Reaching Home. This has meant more engagement with local Indigenous organizations that provide transitional/supportive housing and other cultural supports. The worker also has capabilities to connect individuals to the CA system and/or add and update information in HIFIS for the BNL. This also helps to ensure that those who identify as Indigenous are being better captured in the system.

The HMIS system has been updated to ensure that By Name functionality is present which will streamline efforts in ensuring clients are represented on the By Name List. Training for all Service Providers regarding the coordinated access system and HMIS has been provided and weekly meetings occur for the client prioritization purposes. A Coordinated Access Guide has been developed and provided to service providers to ensure fidelity to the model is achieved.
As a Built For Zero (BFZ) Canada community, we, (Community Entity and Service Manager) have been engaging with our BFZ Advisor to identify any outstanding criteria to be met and how to complete them. We have been clarifying the required participation for the various Reaching Home (RH) funded projects and have had some conversations with funded agencies/programs around coordinated access, HIFIS, and data sharing agreements. We will continue to work with all RH funded programs to ensure participation and documentation of committment.





The City of Kingston, as the housing & homelessness Service Manager, has worked on upgrading HIFIS to the newest version and in doing so is, or will be providing training and support to service providers utilizing the system. The By-Name List is now incorporated into HIFIS which eliminates the need to keep information tracked in multiple areas. The City is embarking on more quality assurance and running reports to ensure that they systems and data collection are correct. There are weekly By-Name List meetings with service providers and ongoing discussions regarding data collection and integrity.




